In 2019, before it was embroiled in the court system, I appeared at the Attorney General's Office with my valid RSA 91-A typewritten request for the New Hampshire Laurie List (now referred to as the Exculpatory Evidence Schedule). I handed the request to the employee at the window. Within minutes a police officer appeared before me, his badge visible on his hip. I noticed a sheepish look on his face. He asked me if he could "hold the door for me." I did not understand why I was being removed. He then asked me if he could say something to me. I responded yes. He then said, "the people who murdered your son-in-law are monsters." I then realized he did know why I was there and also that he probably did not agree with how I was being treated. I responded that he was correct. He then asked me if he could say something else. I replied in the affirmative. He then said, "I see people in your situation all the time, I would like you to take care of yourself." I began to cry, not due to anything he had said, but due to how I was being treated. I told him he did not cause my tears and that he was a fine young man to care about my wellbeing. He asked if I had far to drive and I said I did not and that I would wait until I was composed before I drove home. I thanked him and went out the door he was holding open for me. I do not believe any citizen should be treated this way and I would hope Attorney General McDonald will indeed begin to exercise transparency in his office. Thank you for your forum. Linda Wojas
